Holy Communion is celebrated today.

The Sacrament of the Altar is the true body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ under the bread and wine, for us Christians to eat and to drink, instituted by Christ Himself. Jesus Christ is

present in the sacrament by His Word and we receive His gifts through faith for the assurance of the forgiveness of our sins and for strength to live new life in Him.

Our practice of closed communion is the historic practice of the church. It is prompted by love, both for God's Word and God's people. It does not deny that members of other denominations are Christians. Rather, it acknowledges God's deep concern for doctrinal truth (Rom. 16:17) and the Bible's witness that doctrinal unity is central to the common reception of this sacrament.

For this reason, guests who desire to commune are asked to speak with the pastor before the service.

Advance registration for this service today is also registration for communion. In the interim the use of communion registration cards will be suspended and have been removed from the pews.

Those who are not yet confirmed are welcome to come to receive a blessing, but are asked to keep their hands folded.

St. Matthew's is limited to two groups of 25 people/service (one cohort in sanctuary/one cohort in the basement) until at least January 11, 2022

Because intermingling is not to take place,
Holy Communion will be brought to the basement attendees
Divine Service at 11:30 A.M. in-person and livestreamed
Divine Service at 1:00 P.M. in-person only (if necessary)
We are NOT requiring a proof of vaccination to attend service.

The use of at minimum non-medical masks is required.

Pre-registration is required because of seating limitations to ensure you have a place.

Divine Service at Grace: The use of at minimum non-medical masks is required.

A READING FROM THE BOOK OF CONCORD

FIRST SUNDAY OF CHRISTMAS APOLOGY OF THE AUGSBURG CONFESSION ARTICLE XXIV, THE MASS

The use of the Sacrament, in which faith enlivens terrified hearts, is a service of the New Testament. That is because the New Testament requires spiritual inclinations, making dead and alive. Christ instituted the Sacrament for this use, since He commanded the disciples to do this in remembrance of Him. Remembering Christ is not the use-less celebration of a show. It is not something set up for the sake of example. Rather, it is remembering Christ's benefits and receiving them through faith, to be enlivened by them. So Psalm 111:4–5 says, "He has caused His wondrous works to be remembered; the Lord is gracious and merciful. He provides food for those who fear Him." The Sacrament illustrates that God's will and mercy should be discerned in the ceremony. Faith that grasps mercy enlivens. This is the chief use of the Sacrament. It is clear who are fit for the Sacrament (terrified consciences) and how they use it.

The sacrifice also is added. For there are several reasons with one purpose. After a conscience encouraged through faith has determined from what terrors it is freed, it fervently gives thanks for Christ's benefit and passion. It also uses the ceremony itself to God's praise, to show its gratitude by this obedience. It declares that it holds God's gifts in high esteem. So the ceremony becomes a sacrifice of praise.


