The Sacrament of the Altar is the true body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ under the bread and wine, for us Christians to eat and to drink, instituted

by Christ Himself. Jesus Christ is present in the sacrament by His Word and we receive His gifts through faith for the assurance of the forgiveness of our sins and for strength to live new life in Him.

Our practice of closed communion is the historic practice of the church. It is prompted by love, both for God's Word and God's people. It does not deny that members of other denominations are Christians. Rather, it acknowledges God's deep concern for doctrinal truth (Rom. 16:17) and the Bible's witness that doctrinal unity is central to the common reception of this sacrament.

For this reason, guests who desire to commune are asked to speak with the pastor before the service.

Advance registration for this service today is also registration for communion. In the interim the use of communion registration cards will be suspended and have been removed from the pews.

Those who are not yet confirmed are welcome to come to receive a blessing, but are asked to keep their hands folded.

Bible Study may resume in person in the next few weeks. Alternatives are via electronic means. If you are interested, please talk to Pastor Wood.

"I was glad when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of the LORD!'" (Psalm 122:1 ESV) We give thanks to God that in-person Divine Service has resumed. As of today in Manitoba we are allowed to have up to 30% capacity at St. Matthew's up to a maximum of 50 people. Up to 30 people are allowed at Grace.

Beginning next Sunday: St. Matthew's will have one service at 9:30 A.M. (MB) with 50 person limit. This will also be live-streamed. Divine Service will resume at Grace (for the first time in 15 weeks) at 10:30 A.M. (SK) with 30 person limit. SDG (Soli Deo Gloria, not Social Distancing Guidelines).

You will still be needing to pre-register.

Our Easter Celebration service will be Sunday, July 12th (3 months late – but we are Easter people!).

A big thank you needs to be extended to Concordia Publishing House for the use of Lutheran Service Builder and the free license (which ends June 30). Lutheran Service Builder has allowed us to legally livestream the service with the hymns and to post the order of service on our parish website. The cost is \$425 USD for the first year and \$175 after the first year, plus \$75 USD/year for the hymn license for the parish. It is hoped that we may be able to continue to use this for our livestreaming ministry (this was not budgeted but special offerings for this would be welcomed). For more information on this please speak to Pastor Wood.

A READING FROM THE BOOK OF CONCORD THIRD SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST APOLOGY OF THE AUGSBURG CONFESSION ARTICLE XXVII: MONASTIC VOWS

God's kingdom is *righteousness and life in hearts* (Romans 14:17), perfection is growth in the fear of God, growth in confidence in the mercy promised in Christ, and growth in devotion to one's calling. Paul also describes perfection this way, "[We] are being transformed into the same image from one degree of glory to another. For this comes from the Lord who is the Spirit" (2 Corinthians 3:18). He does not say, "We are continually receiving another hood or other sandals or other girdles." It is regrettable that such pharisaic, indeed, Muslim, expressions should be read and heard in the Church. For they say the perfection of the Gospel and Christ's kingdom (which is eternal life) should be wed along with these foolish observances about vestments and similar trifles. They say:

It has been clearly declared in the Holy Scriptures that the monastic life merits eternal life if maintained by a due observance, which by the grace of God any monk can maintain.

Where do the Holy Scriptures speak of a monastic life? Besides, they dishonor Christ when they say that men merit eternal life by monasticism...for Christ's sake, through mercy, eternal life is granted to those who through faith receive forgiveness and do not apply their own merits against God's judgment... (paragraphs 27-30, 32)


