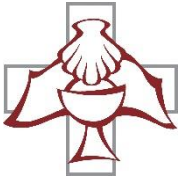

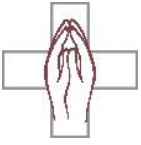


Welcome to all our Guests and Visitors worshipping with us today! Whoever you

The Sacrament of the Altar is the true body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ under the bread and wine, for us Christians to eat and to drink, instituted

by Christ Himself. Jesus Christ is present in the sacrament by His Word and we receive His gifts through faith for the assurance of the forgiveness of our sins and for strength to live new life in Him.

Our practice of closed communion is the historic practice of the church. It is prompted by love, both for God's Word and God's people. It does not deny that members of other denominations are Christians. Rather, it acknowledges God's deep concern for doctrinal truth (Rom. 16:17) and the Bible's witness that doctrinal unity is central to the common reception of this sacrament.

For this reason, guests who desire to commune are asked to speak with the pastor before the service.

Advance registration for this service today is also registration for communion. In the interim the use of communion registration cards will be suspended and have been removed from the pews.

Those who are not yet confirmed are welcome to come to receive a blessing, but are asked to keep their hands folded.

Today is **Food Bank Sunday** and **LWMLC Mite Box Sunday** at St. Matthew’s.

“I was glad when they said to me, ‘Let us go to the house of the LORD!’” (Psalm 122:1 ESV) Under the respective provincial health guidelines we are allowed to have up to 65 people (30% capacity and is dependent on seating configuration from pre-registration) at St. Matthew’s and up to 30 people (30% capacity) at Grace.

Pre-registration is requested (by Saturday noon please).

A READING FROM THE BOOK OF CONCORD ALL SAINTS DAY (OBSERVED) LARGE CATECHISM, THE TEN COMMANDMENTS

Now we have the Ten Commandments, a summary of divine teaching about what we are to do in order that our whole life may be pleasing to God. Everything that is to be a good work must arise and flow from and in this true fountain. So apart from the Ten Commandments no work or thing can be good or pleasing to God, no matter how great it is in the world's eyes. Let us see now what our great saints can boast of their spiritual orders and their great and mighty works. They have invented and set these things up, while they let these commandments go, as though they were far too insignificant or had long ago been perfectly fulfilled.

I am of the opinion that one will find his hands full (and will have enough) to do to keep these commandments: love, meekness, patience, towards enemies, chastity, kindness, and other such virtues. But such works are not of value in the world's eyes. Therefore, they are not highly regarded.

But the other works cause people to open their eyes and ears wide. Men waft incense, they sing and ring bells, they light tapers and candles. For when a priest stands there in a surplice garment embroidered with gold thread, or a layman stays all day upon his knees in Church, that is regarded as a most precious work, which no one can praise enough. But when a poor girl tends a little child and faithfully does what she is told, that is considered nothing. For what else should monks and nuns seek in their cloisters?(paragraphs 311-314)

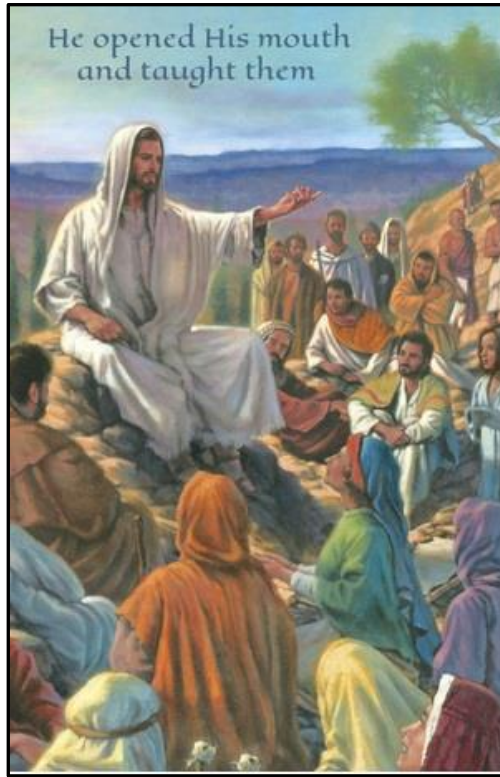
